
PRESIDENTS REPORT

2021 proved another challenging but successful year for the Centre of Projection Art. Our flagship project the Gertrude St Projection Festival was impacted by lockdowns for the second year, just 5 days before the launch. Despite the logistical obstacle this presented, the talents and hard work of the CPA team and our collaborating artists and curator we were able to move much of the programme on line and provide artists talks via digital media platforms. This reflects very much our agility and capability to create and engage across a variety of mediums and not be restricted to site specific work.

Beyond the festival the year remained a busy one with residency programmes, masterclasses and a number of other projects including the Midsummer Festival. Our thanks to both Creative Victoria, City of Yarra and the Besen Foundation for the continued support for our programmes across the year – despite the challenges COVID presented. Our special thanks go to Nelson Alexander for the incredible support of the Cubbies Project, where the ground work for the work was completed, the final art we hope to illuminate in 2022. Thank you to our wonderful Board member Edwina Bartlem to step in and curate A Strange Space – the Midsumma Festival programme. Outside of specific projects, the CPA team continued to build engagement and networks around Victoria, finishing the year with the aim to expand nationally and internationally in the future.

During the year we said goodbye to our CEO Bianca Bowman and welcomed our new CEO Priya Namana. Bianca's leadership, dedication and tireless work over 3 years built our success during some of the most extraordinary challenges our community has seen in a generation, and we are all grateful for her enormous contribution. In welcoming Priya, we are already seeing her exciting vision for the next phase of growth for CPA. We are excited about her experience as a practising visual artist and how this will impact the direction of our wo.

The whole team at Centre for Projection Art have worked tirelessly during some challenging days, and on behalf of the Board, we extend our grateful thanks to the Centres wonderful team, all our volunteers, City of Yarra and Stonnington, our financial supporters noted, the artists who work with us in sharing their talent, vision and voice, and the community whose continued support is helping to build a very exciting future for new mediums of projection and digitally based arts practice.



FINANCIALS - TREASURERS REPORT

This report summarises the Centre for Projection Art Inc's (the Centre) financial performance for the year 1 January 2021 to 31 December 2020.

The Centre made a net surplus of \$78,717 in 2021 (2020: \$36,811). Net assets at 31 December 2021 were \$150,009 (\$71,292).

The aim of the Board in 2021 was to get back on track in pursuing our strategic objectives after the disruptions of 2020 due to COVID. This was challenging as further lockdowns and restrictions continued to impact our work. However we were still able to strengthen our financial position due to the COVID funds made available to qualifying small to medium organisations, and we saw increased activity in the latter part of 2021. We are now in a good financial position to support more intense activity and growth in 2022.

Income for the Centre in 2021 was generated through project management and curation, projector hire, and COVID funding. Staffing was increased in 2021 from 0.6 FTE to 1.3 FTE. Our aim in 2022 is to grow our revenue so we can continue to increase our staff, which in turn will enable us to champion, incubate and present more and more projection art in Australia.

This Standard also requires us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with ASRE 2400 is a limited assurance engagement. The assurance practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making enquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less than those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.


ARTISTS IN RESIDENCE PROGRAM

The inaugural residency program for artists emerging in the projection medium continued in 2021. The residency included mentorship and a fee for a public outcome and was supported by Besen Family Foundation and Creative Victoria.

Eight artists were mentored by established artists to develop works that incorporate projection.

The Residency Program, originally structured as a face to face, in-studio program, successfully adapted to a digital-hybrid model due to the pandemic, continuing to support artists, mentors and arts workers. Residents communicated with Mentors and each other via video conferencing; artist talks and tutorials were presented online, and all artists were delivered a projector to utilise and continue their practice at home during lockdown periods. Professional, industry and creative development opportunities were achieved through various public activations, events and networking.

Our goal to provide a professional, arts industry mentorship in the projection medium was achieved, supporting the creation of new work and contributing to the creative economy.



A STRANGE SPACE

A Strange Space is an open-air exhibition of site-responsive projection art, performance, music, dance and online interactive works by LGBTQIA+ artists and allies, presented within the Collingwood Yards courtyard, the Centre for Projection Art Studio and online.

Co-curated by Edwina Bartlem and Jacob Tolo for the Centre for Projection Art and the 2021 Midsumma Festival, the projection artworks and performances featured in this multi-arts program explore the theme of "A Strange Space" and the various forms, ideas and experiences that this concept evokes.

A Strange Space programmed 12 artists with projection works, 5 live performance based works and an online program with 5 artists in and around Collingwood Yards.



COMMUNITY PROJECTS

YALUK-UT WEELAM NGARGEE FESTIVAL

In 2021, the Centre for Projection Art team assisted in facilitating the amazing projection work by Coffinbirth aka Charlotte at Gareeal, the official opening of Yaluk-ut Weelam Ngargee Festival, presented by Triple R - 3RRR 102.7FM. Featuring performances by Allara, Alice Skype, Bumpy, Monica Jasmine Karo, Brent Watkins, and Ensemble Dutala & friends.

The Yaluk-ut Weelam Ngargee Festival is a celebration of Indigenous culture, taking place from Thursday 25 — Sunday 28 March 2021 in St Kilda.

PETER MAC & CENTRE FOR PROJECTION ART: RADIATION THERAPY PROJECTION ART FOR KIDS

This project is the brainchild of Medical Radiation Practitioner Dr Daniel Sapkaroski who approached the Centre for Projection Art to make his vision a reality. CPA worked closely with Dr Sapkaroski and curator Jacob Tolo to realise this project further. An animated light show has been installed to welcome young patients to the room, to ease anxiety and distract them before their radiotherapy treatment. The radiation therapy bunker used for paediatric patients at Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre was transformed into key a playful space for paediatric patients to engage with animated projections around Christmas, New Years and these deliveries continue into 2022 for Easter and end of treatment for some patients.

"We really wanted to bring the outside in and make the entrance to the bunker fun and interactive for kids as they come through to the treatment machine," Dr Sapkaroski says. "Seeing the smiles on their faces as they chase the birds and butterflies and try to catch the snowflakes is what it's all about." The projection installation is the latest in a series of innovative projects by Peter Mac's Radiation Therapy department to make treatment less daunting for young patients. The team also use virtual reality, radiation therapy mask painting and special effects videos documenting the patients' treatment journey to make the process a little less scary both for the kids and their families.

VACCHO: THE BEAUTIFUL SHAWL PROJECT

In 2021, we were approached by Victorian Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation Inc to help them celebrate their 25th anniversary and NAIDOC Week by projecting some of the magnificent artworks from The Beautiful Shawl project. We were honoured to be able to assist with this project and to light up the Wurundjeri and Boonwurrung skies.


GERTRUDE STREET PROJECTION FESTIVAL 2021
